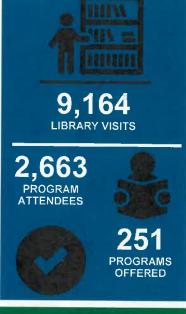

RE: NWCWD / EATON WATER IMPACT FEE RECOMMENDATION

North Weld County Water District (NWCWD) has increased its Plant Investment Fees (PIFs) required to cover the costs for increased demands, due to development, to treat and deliver water to their direct and wholesale customers, which also includes the Town of Eaton.

Through Northern's development of the Town's Treated Water Master Plan, it was identified that the current Town Water Impact Fees may be insufficient to cover the assessed fees from NWCWD, while also maintaining the Town's needs and requirements for future water supplies, reserve requirements, infrastructure and resiliency.

Northern Engineering has been working with its subconsultant, Ally Utility Consulting and Town staff to determine the short term and long term impacts related to the increase in NWCWD fees. See attached memo by Ally Utility Consulting.

In general, the Town historically has assessed approximately 1/3 of a full NWCWD PIF, based on the Town's average level of service as part of the Town's Water Impact Fee to each new tap as sold through the Town's **Building Permit process.**

After review and analysis by Town staff and its consultants, with increases to NWCWD PIFs from \$12,100 to \$21,250 over the past 3 years, and to maintain currently established Town assessment for internal system improvements, staff RECOMMENDS increasing the Town of Eaton Water Impact Fee from \$10,200 to \$13,494.

Subject: Town of Eaton Water PIF Increase Recommendation

This memo summarizes a review of the Town's historic documents and practices with respect to determining and assessing Impact Fees / Plant Investment Fees ("PIFs") for potable water service for new taps. The Town requested assistance in determining how to ensure recent increases from your water supplier (North Weld County Water District) were fairly passed along to new Development. Based on my understanding and conversations with Town staff, I'm recommending an increase that passes these NWCWD fee increases to new Eaton taps, while also ensuring that Eaton continues to collect funds for other future water project investments.

In 2019, NWCWD updated how they assess PIFs to cover the costs to increase the treating and delivery of water to the connection point with Eaton's distribution system. These fees also adjust the Maximum Delivery on a per gallon per minute (gpm) basis and million gallons (MG) basis as Eaton requires increases to flow and volume delivery from NWCWD. Eaton in turn charges "Water Impact Fees" to new water taps sold through the Town's building permit process. Eaton's Water Impact Fees are designed to cover the NWCWD PIFs, and provide additional funds for future water Eaton projects including NISP. Water Rights are handled separately and while these costs are significant, they have not been included in this apples-to-apples comparison of infrastructure ("plants, pipes and pumps") fees.

To ensure that these recent NWCWD fee increases are accurately "passed through" to new Eaton water taps, an increase in Eaton's Impact Fees are recommended. This is good business practice and will continue to ensure that new growth pays its way, and doesn't burden existing Eaton water customers with growth related costs. This will also ensure that Eaton preserves its ability to collect additional money for NISP and related water infrastructure investments.

Based on review of historic studies and conversations with Town staff, I've summarized the historic tap fee assessments in the table below. The far right column (in blue text) is

the recommended approach based on NWCWD tap fees which recently increased from \$12,100 to \$17,650.

The table illustrates that by increasing Eaton's Water Impact Fees from \$10,200 to \$13,494, the Town can ensure new water taps cover the increased NWCWD fees as well as protect the Town's fees for future water supplies, infrastructure needs and resiliency.

SUMMARY

An annual water lease of one hundred acre-feet of the Town's North Poudre Irrigation Company to North Weld County Water District (NWCWD) in exchange for the sale of 20 wholesale water taps.

DESCRIPTION

An annual water lease of one hundred acre-feet of the Town's North Poudre Irrigation Company water designated for municipal water use, to begin May 1 and terminate in November of 2022. This lease has a 2-year renewal option at the Town's discretion.

In consideration of the use of the water rights, the District shall pay the Town's costs and expenses associated with the ownership of the water rights, which include Rule 11 Fees and North Poudre Assessments, as set forth on Exhibit A. This estimated to be \$11,600.

In further consideration of the use of the water rights, the District hereby agrees to sell twenty (20) Standard Plant Investment Taps, along with the corresponding Standard Water Taps, as those terms are defined in the water agreement, to the Town per year during the Initial Term and Renewal Terms of this Agreement. The sale shall be made pursuant to the terms of and in accordance with the Water Agreement. The current wholesale tap at NWVWD is \$13,237.50 a tap.

The purchase of the whole sale tap is the in essence the purchase of capacity in the system for the town and is important to secure during this time of partial moratorium and the construction of the NEWT III pipeline from Fort Collins area.

KEY POINTS

The lease of 100-acre feet of the Town's NPIC water rights. The Town has consistently had an excess of NPIC water rights the past 5 years well in excess of 200-acre feet and in most years above 300-acre feet. (see attachment).

 This leased water will be used primarily to help the rural agricultural community that NWCWD serves.

- NWCWD will cover the Rule 11 transfer fees. Estimated at \$11,600.00.
- The water will be put to beneficial use.
- The Town gains the right to purchase 20 wholesale taps in 2022 during a partial moratorium. \$13,237.50 per taps

COST & BUDGET

- The Town budget includes \$300,000 in funds allocated in the Eaton Water Enterprise for Water Bank. These funds could be used for the purchase of water taps to increase capacity within the town's distribution system.
- NWCWD will cover the Rule 11 transfer fees. Estimated at \$11,600.

RECOMMENDATION

- 1. Staff Recommendation:
 - a. Motion to approve the annual water lease with North Weld County Water District pursuant to the terms of the attached lease and to authorize staff to acquire 20 wholesale water taps for the Town of Eaton's water distribution system pursuant to the terms and conditions of the water service agreement.

This memorandum provides an overview of Eaton's water supplies and potential leasing opportunities. We understand the Town owns 1,005 Colorado-Big Thompson (C-BT) units and 207.5 North Poudre Irrigation Company (NPIC) shares. Each NPIC share consists of a native agricultural component and four units of C-BT. The C-BT units can be used for the Town's municipal uses while the NPIC agricultural component can be used for irrigation as a non-potable supply within the NPIC service area (unless changed in Water Court in the future). The estimated average yield of a C-BT unit is 0.7 acre-feet per year (AFY) and the firm yield is 0.5 AFY. The estimated average yield of the NPIC agricultural component is 2.5 AFY and the firm yield is 0.5 AFY. The NPIC agricultural component yields are based on the yields provided in the 2018 Municipal Water Efficiency Plan, which were obtained from the ditch company.

In total, Eaton's potable water supply of C-BT units averages 1,285 AFY and the firm yield is 918 AFY. The average and firm yields of the NPIC agricultural component for Eaton's shares are 519 AFY and 104 AFY, respectively. A summary is provided in **Table 1.** Note that the Town also uses wells for non-potable uses, which are not included in Table 1.

We evaluated how much excess C-BT water the Town could potentially lease to other water users. We analyzed the North Weld County Water District (NWCWD) master meter data and Eaton's customer water usage. Based on the Water Service Agreement between Eaton and NWCWD, the Town provides raw water in the amount of 110% of the total measured potable water usage at the master meter for the previous year, plus any anticipated increases in use. The 10% is used to cover losses that occur within NWCWD's system.

The average of the last five years (2016-2020) of master meter data from NWCWD is 848 AFY. The 2020 master metered volume was 900 AF. Including the additional 10% surcharge, Eaton's estimated total water supply needed for treatment is 990 AFY based on 2020 data or 933 AFY based on the last five years of data. On average, Eaton would have approximately 352 AF of excess C-BT water it could rent out and had 295 AF of C-BT available to lease in 2020. The excess lease amounts for the Town's C-BT water is shown in **Table 2**

These calculations exclude C-BT carryover, which is the lesser of the Town's October 31st quota account with 10% shrink or 20%*(C-BT units owned). The C-BT carryover is excluded as it is assumed the Town will maximize its carryover from year-to-year as added drought protection, so it is recommended only to lease excess supplies beyond what is needed for carryover.

We can monitor the lease potential after the initial quota is set in November by the Northern Colorado Water Conservancy District (Northern Water) Board and reevaluate if a supplemental quota is issued in April. If water is leased early in the irrigation season, the lease rate is higher. We typically help clients lease excess supplies in April and then evaluate again in August if there is any additional water to lease later in the season. C-BT units can be leased to other water users within Northern Water's district boundary.

The Town can also lease its NPIC agricultural component to other irrigation shareholders in the NPIC system, and we recommend that it does so every year to keep the NPIC water in use. The agricultural component of an NPIC share could also be changed in Water Court in the future for potable use. The City of Fort Collins and other water providers are currently in the process of changing this component of the NPIC water right.

Finally, the Town of Eaton has a bulk water station that uses potable water and sells it to industrial users. Since the Town's potable water is C-BT units, there are limitations on where the water can be used. Northern Water has policies in place that require all C-BT water to be used within Northern Water's district boundary. Water should not be hauled outside of these areas for oil and gas, construction or other projects. We recommend the Town only provide bulk water to customers with projects inside of Northern Water's boundary.

The Town of Eaton has requested Northern Engineering Services (Northern) to perform research on the potential of cash in lieu or rental options for unused water tied to Colorado Big Thompson (C-BT) and North Poudre Irrigation Company (NPIC).

BACKGROUND

The Town of Eaton (Town) has had several years where there has been surplus of unused water shares. The Town currently owns 1,005 shares of C-BT and 207.5 shares of NPIC stock. One C-BT share equals 1 acre-foot of water and one NPIC share varies between 4.5 to 5 acre-feet of water.

For 2021:

- C-BT shares have an allocation quota of 70% from Northern Water Conservancy District with an additional 10% for system losses claimed by North Weld.
- NPIC shares are comprised of 4.5 acre-feet with 2 acre-feet for agricultural and 2.5 acre-feet for multiuse (MU).

These quotas are typically determined each year in April and can vary from year to year. It is important and recommended to wait each year for these allocations before selling or renting any shares to secure enough water for the Town. We understand the Town is looking for potential alternatives for the surplus of water that is not currently being used by the Town.

NPIC SUMMARY

Northern met with Richard Raines from Tri District and Tet Clapham from NPIC to verify the possibility of renting out the agricultural portion of an NPIC stock. After these conversations, it was made clear the Town can rent out the agricultural portion of NPIC stocks to other stockholders.

- Eaton has a total of 207.5 shares of NPIC, that totals to 415 acre-feet of AG to rent out (allocation is 2 acre-feet of AG water per stock this year).
- Northern has received multiple calls from NPIC stockholders interested in renting AG water from Eaton.
 Calls and emails will now be directed to Jeff and/or Faith from the Town of Eaton. Other towns are renting their water between \$42-\$44 per acre-foot per water year. There seems to be a shortage since it sounds like Ft. Collins is not renting out any water due to last year's fires.
- Eaton must get in contact with the stockholders and figure out how much water they want to rent and
 come to agreement with the terms/contract Eaton wants to set in place for this rental. NPIC does not
 need to be involved in contract or invoicing of this water. Contracts and invoicing will be between
 Eaton and the stockholder only.
- Once Eaton knows who they are renting the AG water to and how much they are transferring, they can
 contact Tet Clapham with this information, and he will transfer the water. It is a very straightforward
 process. Tet's contact information is below.



• The NPIC Municipal Use (MU) portion of a stock can also be rented to stockholders or portions of a stock can be allocated to a new tap within the Town as cash in lieu.

C-BT SUMMARY

After meeting with Richard Raines from Tri District, it was confirmed that the Town currently owns 1,005 shares of C-BT. The allocation quota varies year by year and is reported in April. During drought years, Northern Water has allocated a 50% quota in the past. There is a maximum 20% carryover of shares permitted for the next water year.

- This year, 2021, the C-BT allocation quota is 70% and an additional 10% from North Weld to account for system losses. During drought years, a 50% allocation quota is likely, plus the additional 10% from North Weld.
- There is a 20% maximum carryover of C-BT shares.
- For the years 2017 to 2020, the Town has used all its C-BT water allocations and the 20% carryover.

CONCLUSIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Based on our conversations with Richard Raines, it is recommended that an analysis be performed of current NPIC MU usage and what that usage would be during a drought year, where C-BT and NPIC allocations will be stricter. This would help the Town understand the surplus and flexibility of any unused NPIC MU water that has the potential of being rented or allocated to a tap within a water year. This analysis will protect the Town from any water usage overages.

Range Metropolitan Planning Organization (NFRMPO) Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-2023 call for
Projects. (See Attached letter from then mayor Kevin Ross). This this partnership assisted Weld County's
STBG application in receiving \$1,091,818 in federal funding to improve the intersection of WCR 74 &
WCR 33. The 74/33 intersection improvements are mutually beneficial for both jurisdictions and both
respective Parties agreed to contribute financially to the costs of such improvements.

At present the 33/74 Roundabout is currently scheduled to have utilities relocation work from September through December and contract awarded in January of 2023. The total cost for the improvements for this intersection area are estimated at 9.3 million.

THIS AGREEMENT is made and entered into this _____ day of ______, 2022, by and between the Town of Eaton, State of Colorado, whose address is 223 1st Street, Eaton, Colorado 80615, hereinafter referred to as "Eaton" and the County of Weld, State of Colorado, by and through the Board of County Commissioners of the County of Weld, Colorado whose address is P.O. Box 758, 915 10th Street, Greeley, Colorado 80632, hereinafter referred to as "Weld County".

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, Eaton provided a financial commitment letter to Weld County's Surface Treatment Block Grant (STBG) application in 2018 in the amount of \$22,696 for the North Front Range Metropolitan Planning Organization (NFRMPO) Fiscal Year (FY) 2022-2023 call for projects; and

WHEREAS, this partnership assisted Weld County's STBG application in receiving \$1,091,818 in federal funding to improve the intersection of WCR 74 & WCR 33; and

WHEREAS, both Parties recognize the 74/33 intersection improvements are mutually beneficial for both jurisdictions and the Parties agree to contribute financially to the costs of such improvements, hereinafter referred to as "Project", as identified in Exhibit A.

WHEREAS, the Parties hereto desire to enter into this Agreement to define the roles and responsibilities of each of the parties regarding the completion of the Project, and

WHEREAS, both parties are authorized to enter into intergovernmental agreements with one another, pursuant to C.R.S. § 29-1-203 and Colorado Constitution Article XIV, § 18(2)(1), for the purpose of achieving greater efficiencies for the provision of services to the public.

NOW THEREFORE, in consideration of the above and the mutual promises and covenants contained herein, the Parties hereto agree as follows:

- 1. <u>TERM</u>: The term of this Agreement shall be from the date first written above to and until such time as the Project described herein shall be completed.
- 2. <u>DESCRIPTION OF IMPROVEMENTS:</u> Weld County will be responsible for designing, acquiring right-of-way, obtaining utility relocations, and constructing and managing the Project.
- 3. <u>CONTRIBUTION BY EATON:</u> Eaton agrees to pay to Weld County by December 31, 2023 the sum of \$22,696 as a proportional share contribution to the Project.
- 4. <u>ENTIRE AGREEMENT</u>: This writing, together with any exhibits attached hereto, constitutes the entire Agreement between the parties hereto with respect to the subject matter herein, and shall be binding upon said parties, their officers, employees, agents and assigns and shall inure to the benefit of the respective survivors, heirs, personal representatives, successors and assigns of said parties.

- 5. NO THIRD-PARTY BENEFICIARY ENFORCEMENT: It is expressly understood and agreed that the enforcement of the terms and conditions of this Agreement, and all rights of action relating to such enforcement, shall be strictly reserved to the undersigned parties and nothing in this Agreement shall give or allow any claim or right of action whatsoever by any other person not included in the Agreement. It is the express intention of the undersigned parties that any entity other than the undersigned parties receiving services or benefits under this Agreement shall be an incidental beneficiary only.
- 6. <u>SEVERABILITY</u>: If any term or condition of this Agreement shall be held to be invalid, illegal, or unenforceable, this Agreement shall be construed and enforced without such provision to the extent that this Agreement is then capable of execution within the original intent of the parties hereto.
- 7. MODIFICATION AND BREACH: This Agreement contains the entire agreement and understanding between the Parties of this Agreement and supersedes any other agreements concerning the subject matter of this transaction, whether oral or written. No modification, amendment, notation, renewal, or other alteration of or to this Agreement shall be deemed valid or of any force or effect whatsoever, unless mutually agreed upon in writing by the undersigned parties. No breach of any term, provision, or clause of this Agreement shall be deemed waived or excused, unless such waiver or consent shall be in writing and signed by the party claimed to have waived or consented. Any consent by any party hereto, or waiver of, a breach by any other party, whether express or implied, shall not constitute a consent to, waiver of, or excuse for any other different or subsequent breach.

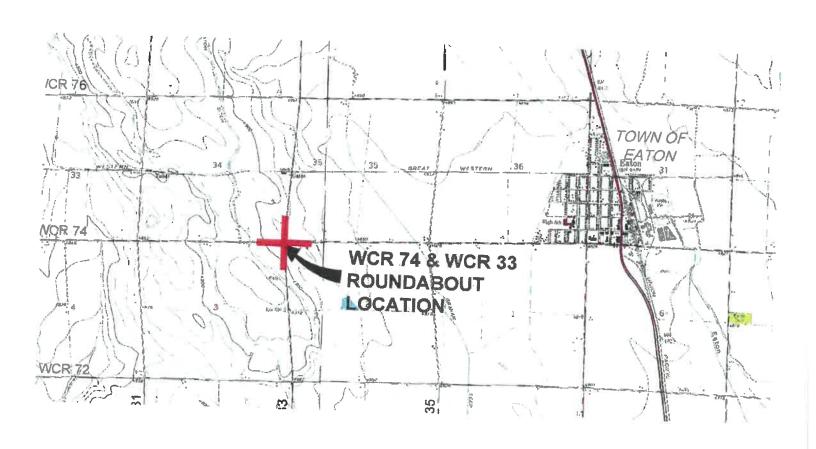

TOWN OF EATON, COLORADO ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING SECTION 9-2-7 OF THE EATON MUNICIPAL CODE CONCERNING WATER SYSTEM CAPACITY FEES

WHEREAS, the Town of Eaton, Colorado ("Town") is a municipal corporation duly organized and existing under the Constitution and laws of the State of Colorado; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board of Trustees ("Town Board") is vested with the authority to administer the affairs of the Town; and

WHEREAS, Section II of Chapter IX of the Eaton Municipal Code ("Code") regulates water main taps and Section 9-2-7 contained therein addresses water system capacity fees; and

WHEREAS, to eliminate the codification of amendments to the Town's water system capacity fees, Town staff recommends that the Town Board amend Section 9-2-7 to provide that water system capacity fees be set by resolution of the Town Board; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board desires to adopt Town staff's recommendations; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board finds, determines and declares that this Ordinance is promulgated under the general police power of the Town, is promulgated for the preservation of public health, welfare, peace, safety and property and is in the best interests of the Town of Eaton.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE TOWN OF EATON, COLORADO, THAT:

Section 1. Section 9-2-7. Eaton Municipal Code Section 9-2-7 shall be amended in full to read as follows:

Sec. 9-2-7. Water System Capacity Fee.

Water system capacity fees shall be paid simultaneously with the issuance of a building permit in the amount set forth by resolution of the Town Board.

<u>Section 2.</u> Severability. If any part or provision of this Ordinance, or its application to any person or circumstance, is adjudged to be invalid or unenforceable, the invalidity or unenforceability of such part, provision, or application shall not affect any of the remaining parts, provisions or applications of this Ordinance that can be given effect without the invalid provision, part or application, and to this end the provisions and parts of this Ordinance are declared to be severable.

PROJECT CHANGES: The Roundabout Project is currently under construction with Duran Excavating in at the intersection of WCR 74 (Collins Street) and WCR 35. Several Change Orders have been issued to deal with various items related to the construction of the roundabout.

Items range from applying Mag Chloride and providing Messages Boards for a longer duration at the request of Weld County, to utility conflicts that require engineering redesign and utility relocation to resolve the conflicts. Some items were not part of the original and have been added to the project such as a water service to the roundabout island and additional sidewalk improvements. Additional milling was required of the existing roadway pavement when the thickness was greater than the geotechnical report had provided.

A large portion of cost overruns is directly related to unstable and unsuitable soil that was uncovered in isolated roadway areas. This soil was required to be removed and approved soil installed with geogrid to provide the stability and compaction required for the base of the asphalt pavement. These types of costs are not uncommon on roadway projects.

Additional construction costs applied to the project have been a direct result of the current economy and inflation of material prices and supply chain issues that delay the delivery of material. A fuel cost surcharge has been applied by several companies to offset the increase in oil and gas prices that continue to rise.

CHANGE ORDER SUMMARY: The following table provides a Summary of Change Orders that have been issued to date and changes that have been approved but actual costs have not been received from the Contractor. Underground utility conflicts and the design and construction of the island signage are large cost items that once addressed, will not be recurring in future change orders.

With the majority of underground work complete and the roadways stabilized, work can begin on the concrete curb and gutter, medians, sidewalks, and the roundabout apron.

ACTION REQUESTED:

On January 20, 2022, the Town Board approved Town Staff to authorize additional expenditures for the base bid of up to \$2,550,000.00 on the project as needed. In addition, Town Board approved Town Staff to authorize additional expenditures for the Landscape Island up to \$90,000.00 on the project as needed. For reference, below were the bids evaluated:

From the Change Order Summary Table above, expenditures have almost met the previously authorized amounts. Additional funds are requested to meet the impending construction cost modifications and to assure the project can keep moving forward on schedule.

Staff recommends the Town Board to authorize additional expenditures, for both base bid and landscaping alternative, to the total project in the amount, not to exceed, \$3,000,000.00. This would be a total additional expense of \$360,000 above the currently approved expenditures.

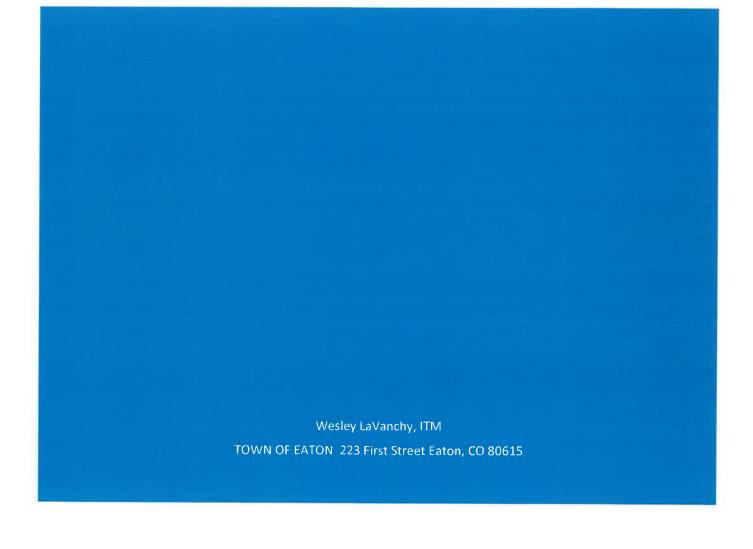
OPTIONAL ACTION REQUIRED:

The Construction has been approved to install medians with standard grey concrete. However, conversations have indirectly been heard about possible changes to its look. Northern has engaged the Contractor for options to construct colored and/or stamped medians. These approximate costs for optional additional services have been provided.

Due to the planned landscape island improvements and visual impacts, the changes to colored and/or stamped medians would not provide a significant look at the intersection. Should the Board desire to pick one of the 2 options, the following additional expenditures would be recommended:

June Board of Trustees meeting and answer questions.

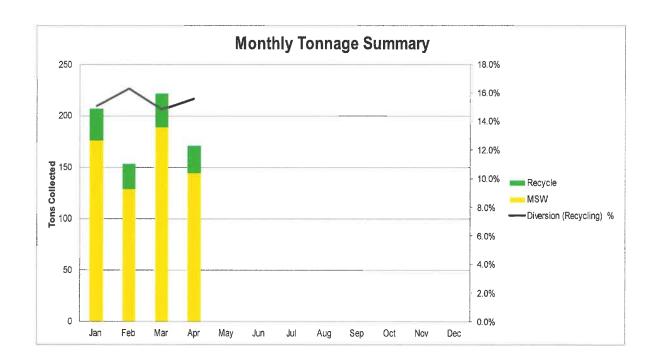
Planning:

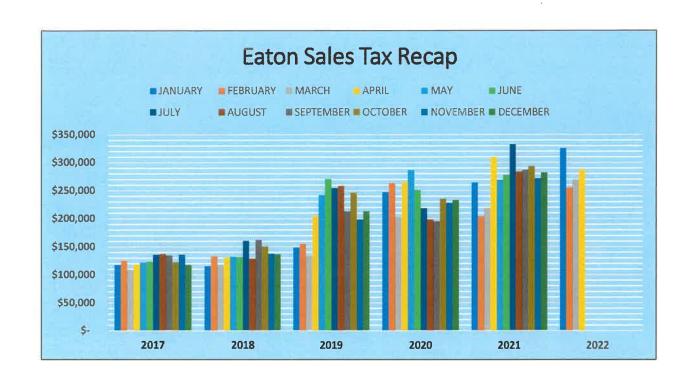
- Pavement Management Program Street Condition Survey. We have completed a

MEETING DATE: May 19, 2022

PROJECT SUMMARY: The Project Notice to Proceed was issued to Duran Excavating on March 1, 2022.

Work began with rough grading of the roundabout area and the four connection roadway legs along WCR 74 (Collins Street) east-west and WCR 35 north-south. Installation of storm drain lines and inlets were installed on the south and north roadways. Existing utilities are in the process of being relocated outside of the roundabout construction area.

Earthwork has been removed at roadways to subgrade along the north, east and south legs of the roundabout. Areas that were found to be unstable were removed and replaced with approved material and geotextile fabric to provide support for future pavement. Aggregate base course was installed and compacted in preparation for future asphalt pavement.

The curb and gutter has recently been installed along the east and south outside legs of the roundabout.

SCHEDULED WORK: Work within the next few weeks will continue on the remaining storm drain lines and inlets on the west leg of the roundabout. Curb and gutter will be installed on the outside north leg. Earthwork to prepare the subgrade along the west leg will begin and aggregate base course will be installed and compacted.

The water service line will be installed to the roundabout island for landscape irrigation.

Layout work will begin for the interior median curb and gutter along the east and south legs of the roundabout.
